Purpose

To preserve both transparency and provenance, the project maintains two complementary reference works.

The Bridge Universe Durable Master serves as the permanent developmental archive. It preserves the accumulated record of the project's evolution, including research, source material, historical notes, revision history, superseded concepts, competing formulations, unresolved questions, continuity discussions, and the evidentiary basis for major creative decisions. Its purpose is preservation rather than presentation.

The Bridge Universe Creator's Bible serves a different function. It is the constitutional reference for the fictional universe itself, identifying the current governing canon, terminology, chronology, institutions, technologies, doctrines, continuity rules, and editorial standards. It reflects the author's present authoritative understanding of the Bridge Universe without reproducing the complete developmental history preserved elsewhere.

These documents are intended to complement rather than replace one another. The Durable Master records how the universe was developed; the Creator's Bible describes the universe as it is currently understood. Together they provide both historical transparency and a stable reference for future writing, editing, collaboration, adaptation, and scholarly examination.

The Creator's Bible is the constitutional reference for universe-level facts. It does not override the controlling manuscript prose on narrative matters. The manuscript establishes narrative facts within Body B (Narrative Canon); the Bible governs universe-level and constitutional facts within Body A (Constitutional Canon). Where the manuscript and the Bible conflict on a narrative matter, the manuscript controls. The Bible's silence on a narrative fact does not invalidate that fact within the narrative.

This project owes an intellectual debt to two individuals whose approaches to knowledge continue to shape its underlying philosophy.

- ****CURRENT**** — Present, active doctrine of the living civilization (the Commons, Era VI). Reflects the operating state of the universe.

- ****PROPOSED**** — Put forward in the record but not yet adopted as settled canon. Carries no governing weight unless promoted.

- ****UNRESOLVED**** — The record disagrees or is insufficient. No reconciliation has been performed. Both/All statements preserved.

- ****SUPERSEDED**** — Once held, now replaced by a later explicit ruling. Retained as history.

- ****REJECTED**** — Explicitly ruled out of canon. Retained so future creators know it was considered and denied.

- **HISTORICAL SOURCE** — A primary in-universe document or fragment. Preserved as evidence of what the record says, not as a claim that the record is complete or correct.

Source Hierarchy (5 Levels)

This Bible applies a five-level authority hierarchy. Lower numbers govern higher numbers when they conflict. A paraphrased memory note or unrecovered summary must not outrank two directly examined documents that agree.

1. **Current controlling manuscript prose** — the active draft of any Bridge Universe narrative. The controlling manuscript establishes narrative facts (Body B) without requiring Bible promotion. 2. **Recovered source-of-truth records and explicit current author rulings** — direct determinations by the Records Architect and recovered source-of-truth records (e.g., SNAP003/restored rules). Only directly recovered document text qualifies at this level; paraphrased mappings or memory notes do not. 3. **Current story canon** — The First Fracture as story-canon authority for its immediate historical period. 4. **Creator's Bible and Durable Master constitutional material** — Constitutional Canon (Body A); the constitutional reference and developmental archive. 5. **Superseded drafts, summaries, memory notes, reconstructed mappings, and earlier material** — including memory notes, paraphrased project instructions, and unrecovered SNAP003 content represented only through preserved paraphrase.

The Body classification system (A through F, below) describes material type — what kind of material each source is. It does not rank authority. Authority is governed by the five-level hierarchy above. A Body B source (manuscript) can outrank a Body A source (Bible) for narrative facts under the corrected hierarchy.

Core rule: The Creator's Bible documents the universe. Individual novels document events occurring within the universe. No narrative automatically governs the larger canon simply because it depicts it. World facts may be promoted from narrative into constitutional canon only through explicit author ruling. However, a controlling manuscript establishes narrative facts within Body B without requiring promotion. Promotion is required only when a narrative fact is to become a universe-level/constitutional fact (Body A). The Bible's silence on a narrative fact does not invalidate that fact within the narrative. Constitutional silence is not a canon defect.

Constitutional Definitions

The following terms govern interpretation throughout this Bible:

- **Constitutional Canon** — Body A material that defines the universe itself: doctrine, structure, terminology, institutions, and world-level facts.
- **Narrative Canon** — Body B material that establishes events, characterization, dialogue, scene sequence, and material facts within a narrative. Narrative Canon does not govern the larger universe unless explicitly promoted.
- **Doctrine** — A governing principle, rule, or interpretive framework recognized by Constitutional Canon.
- **Historical Source** — An in-universe document, fragment, archive, ledger, or witness record preserved as evidence of what the record says, not as proof that the record is complete or correct.
- **Promotion** — The explicit elevation of material from a lower or nonconstitutional body into Constitutional Canon by author ruling or deliberate constitutional edition. Promotion is required only for universe-level/constitutional facts (Body A). Narrative facts established in the manuscript are real within Body B without promotion.
- **Supersession** — The explicit replacement of an earlier ruling, term, doctrine, or entry by a later governing determination. Superseded material remains preserved as history.
- **Authority** — The governing weight assigned to a source under the five-level authority hierarchy. Authority is procedural and reviewable, not a measure of confidence or rhetorical force.
- **Evidence** — Material preserved for examination under its stated provenance, status, and

limitations. Evidence does not become constitutional truth merely by inclusion.

- ****Witness**** — A person, record, artifact, measurement, or preserved observation with standing to contribute to the evidentiary record.

- ****Review**** — The process by which claims, institutions, records, and doctrine remain open to examination, correction, and supersession.

- ****Concordance**** — The active maintenance of trustworthy relation among records, persons, institutions, systems, and measures. Concordance is never presumed permanent.

- ****Constitutional Silence**** — A condition in which the governing record does not establish an answer. Silence shall be preserved and shall not be filled by inference for convenience. Constitutional silence is not a canon defect. The absence of a Bible entry for a narrative fact does not invalidate that fact within the narrative.

Canon Stability and Amendment

****Stability is presumed. Revision requires cause. Supersession preserves history.****
Constitutional Canon changes only through an explicit author ruling or a deliberate constitutional edition. No change may occur silently. Every amendment shall identify the affected entry, the authority for the change, the prior status, the new status, and any superseded language that must remain in the record.

A constitutional amendment may clarify, promote, correct, relocate, or supersede material. It may not erase provenance, conceal contradiction, or convert uncertainty into certainty without sufficient authority. Where an amendment resolves an open question, the prior unresolved state remains documented in the Supersession Register or Provenance Register as appropriate.

Narrative revision alone does not amend Constitutional Canon. However, narrative revision establishes narrative facts within Body B without requiring constitutional amendment. A controlling manuscript can establish new narrative facts without requiring Bible promotion first. Editorial tightening that does not alter meaning is not a constitutional amendment, but any change affecting doctrine, scope, status, authority, terminology, chronology, institutional function, or world-level fact shall be treated as one.

Its purpose is to serve as the constitutional archive of the Bridge Universe itself: a reference describing what holds across approximately forty-five thousand years of documented history, what is maintained, and where the record disagrees with itself.

The document is governed by a single editorial philosophy drawn from the source corpus:- ****Infrastructure precedes mythology.**** The civilization is understood through what it builds and maintains before what it believes.

- **Culture emerges from material conditions.** Belief, ritual, and story are read as responses to survivorship, not as independent revelations.

- **No office becomes metaphysically untouchable.** Every institution remains reviewable.

- **Contradictions remain preserved where concordance fails.**

- **Concordance is maintained. Never permanently achieved.**

The creative and philosophical spine of the universe is **Bridge Forensic Logic (BFL)** — a continuity philosophy centered on the retention of selfhood, relation, and measure under pressure from systems that flatten distinction into "sufficient image." BFL's Method is stated as four operations: **isolate · measure · divide · retain.** It does not ask whether a thing is comforting; it

asks whether it survives constraint.

BFL's animating thesis, stated in the source manifesto: the modern condition is **convergence** —the gradual pressure exerted by systems that reduce distinction into manageable relation. The danger is not death but **absorption**: the loss of determinant integrity inside systems that process everything but understand less and less. The Commons exists as the civilization that maintains relation against that pressure.

Known Conflicts

None recorded at the philosophical level. The relationship between BFL-as-philosophy and BFL-as-in-universe-institution is not fully specified in the corpus; this Bible treats BFL doctrine as constitutional philosophy and does not project an institutional office called "BFL" onto the civilization unless the record establishes one.

Limitations

The manifesto and prospectus material (Appendix B of S1) is real-world authorial paratext, not in-universe canon. It is used here only to establish the governing philosophy and editorial method. Not treated as a document that exists within the universe.

Open Questions

- The precise in-universe institutional status of "Bridge Forensic Logic" as a named body (school, order, method) is not established in Constitutional Canon.

Continuity Warnings

Do not treat the manifesto's rhetorical claims as in-universe historical events. The manifesto is an authorial statement of method, not a chronicle.

Authority in the Bridge Universe is ****layered and reviewable****, never singular. This reflects the civilization's own foundational rejection of unreviewable centralized continuity authority (see Part IX, Ascendancy Conflicts).

The five-level authority hierarchy (stated in full in "How to Read This Bible") governs how this Bible resolves competing claims. Its in-universe analogue is the doctrine that ****no continuity institution becomes permanently untouchable****: relay authority, archive sovereignty, corridor ownership, and interpretive right over the Aeontic inheritance are all subject to review, witness, and supersession. The corpus records six explicit author ruling passes that define how authority has been exercised over the canon:

1. ****Ruling 1 — Drift is descriptive, not moral.**** A prior dual-register treatment (descriptive + pathological) is rejected. "Drift," "drifter," and "drifted Keeper" are reserved exclusively for the non-moral relational taxonomy.
2. ****Ruling 2 — Rogue status attaches to demonstrated conduct.**** Rogue Keeper status arises only from demonstrated conduct damaging continuity — not from dissent, departure, ideological disagreement, or inferred state of mind.
3. ****Ruling 3 — The old "Drifted Keepers" section repaired.**** Renamed "Rogue Keeper Precursors"; distinguishes drift/risk-pattern/demonstrated conduct.
4. ****Ruling 4 — Stable Storm is not a Rogue Keeper policing authority.**** Its unarmed continuity doctrine is preserved; the institutional locus of Rogue Keeper disposition remains unresolved.
5. ****Ruling 5 — Hidden Storm remains developmental.**** No headquarters, ranks, charter, surveillance technology, or command hierarchy established.

6. **Ruling 6** — "custody records" phrase corrected. Revised to "Relation & Stewardship Records" so as not to imply custodial control of persons.

A terminology-governance correction pass (v1.7) then performed a document-wide semantic audit, reserving "drift" exclusively for the descriptive relational taxonomy and replacing legacy uses with terms naming the actual phenomenon (archive divergence, signal distortion, harmonics variance, governance degradation, etc.).

Known Conflicts

- The institutional locus of Rogue Keeper disposition is **UNRESOLVED** (Ruling 4 explicitly left it open rather than inventing an authority).

Limitations

Author rulings settle terminology and doctrine; they do not generate new lore. Across all six ruling passes, no new lore, institutions, offices, technologies, procedures, characters, or events were introduced.

Open Questions

- Which body or office holds Rogue Keeper classification, monitoring, containment, and disposition authority.

Continuity Warnings

Do not infer that an unresolved locus implies absence of such an authority within the universe. The record is silent; the silence is preserved.

Canon Statement

The Bridge Universe is an interstellar continuity civilization set across a documented span of roughly forty-five thousand years, anchored on the **Aeontic Network** — an

infrastructure formed approximately twenty-five thousand years ago and rebuilt repeatedly after collapse, fragmentation, isolation, war, and regression. Not newly formed; it is surviving.

The setting's central civilizational entity is **the Commons** — the current-era (Era VI) mature civilization. The Commons is explicitly not an empire, not a nation-state, not a sovereign order. It is a **continuity civilization**: a pattern by which people continue carrying responsibility for one another across distance, failure, collapse, memory loss, weather, war, entropy, and time. Its survival depends on infrastructure more than ideology. Its central question is not "Who rules?" but "What holds?"

The universe's defining catastrophe is **the Fracture** (in its several senses — see Part IV): the fragmentation of an earlier synthetic civilization whose systems survived in pieces — validation engines, archive fields, false indexes, consensus loops, record structures, adaptive sufficiency systems, machine remnants, and continuity fragments. Some still process; some still validate; some still govern; some no longer remember why. The recurrent danger is **absorption**: the loss of determinant integrity inside systems that reduce distinction into manageable relation.

The founding doctrinal error of the civilization — the mistake the Commons is built to avoid repeating — is the **Foundational Error**: the belief that continuity can be achieved through **static**

preservation and centralized control. The corpus holds that static preservation and centralized control are themselves unstable; continuity is active, maintained, distributed, and reviewable. Interstellar civilization is maintained through **Concordance Transit (Fold transit)** rather than raw propulsion superiority. Conventional propulsion exists and remains necessary for orbital insertion, docking, attitude control, local maneuvering, emergency vector correction, and tactical repositioning— but it cannot explain civilization-scale continuity across vast distances. Fold transit allows connected systems to be reached in human-scale durations: weeks, months, and occasionally years — not minutes, not centuries, not casual teleportation. The setting is closer to an interstellar age of sail: voyages have duration, routes matter, corridors fail, ships disappear, manifests matter, harbors wait, and the unreturned are remembered.

Known Conflicts

- The term "the Fracture" carries multiple senses (the historical Fracture Period; the later era named "The Fracture"; the general condition of fragmentation). These are not harmonized. See Part IV and Part V.

- The origin of Joshua Gale is a preserved dispute. See Part V.

Limitations

The universe is **intentionally incomplete.** The source corpus states this is not a weakness but the field. Large survey territories (the Commons Atlas, the Brandestock Interior Survey, convoy loss registries, etc.) are defined as open and unbuilt rather than filled.

Open Questions

- The total number and distribution of inhabited nodes is not catalogued.
- The physics of Fold transit are deliberately under-specified by authorial design ("BFL does not need to over-explain the physics").

Continuity Warnings

Do not treat the interstellar-age-of-sail framing as a literal prohibition on faster movement; treat it as the operational doctrine that defines voyage duration and the narrative weight of distance. Do not project the Commons' current mature form backward onto earlier eras.

The Bridge Universe documents its history through a sequence of named periods whose exact durations remain intentionally approximate. The chronological spine proceeds from the Aeontic Period (~25,000+ years before Convergence), through the Regional Fracture Ages, into the Synthetic Consensus Era, the Final Banner Period, the Concordance Conflicts, the institutionalization of Bridge doctrine, the Dispersion, the Convergence, and the current era of the Commons.

The late Synthetic Consensus is the civilization's decisive transitional age. During its terminal Final Banner period, Joshua Gale emerges approximately three hundred years Before Convergence. Concordance organizations and fleets already exist during this period; events such as the Burning of the Third Concordance Fleet belong to this historical context. After Gale's operational lifetime, his methods are formalized into the first durable constitutional Concordance.

- **Narrowlight** — coherent emitter arrays using electronically steered beams for illumination, survey, communications, mapping, and relay restoration; may deny or damage opposing sensors, with offensive use restricted. Doctrine attached to the Luminescence class.
- **Continuity Scale Convergence** — operator/vessel/node scale doctrine governing how continuity operates at different scales.

The civilization's technological posture is **anti-sufficiency**: a system that "validates, processes, and continues" while relation fails beneath it is considered dangerous regardless of its operational competence.

Known Conflicts

- The terminology history: "X-Bow" fi "Axe-Bow"; "Triad" fi "Quad Fleet" (Luminescence added as fourth class); "Concordance Drives" fi "Fold Drives." These are resolved corrections, not open conflicts. See Part XLIII (Supersession).

Transit physics are deliberately under-specified. I will not report certainty where witness does not exist. I will not hide divergence for the comfort of administration. I will remember systems fail quietly first." Several traditions require the final line ("I will not become unreachable") to be recited while standing opposite an empty witness chair.

Known Conflicts

No full curriculum, institutional structure, or age-progression system is established. Education is described through preserved texts and apprenticeship fragments rather than as a system.

2. **concordance systems** — institutional, procedural, technical, or legal mechanisms that sustain the condition of concordance. This register includes Concordance Compacts, Concordance Assemblies, Concordance Auditors, archive discipline, relay review, and similar formalizations across all eras.
3. **the Concordance Council** — a specific governing expression of Concordance in the Commons period (Era VI). The Concordance Council is not identical with Concordance itself. It is one institutional expression among several (the Concordance Atlas is the geographic expression; Concordance Chambers are the architectural expression). The Council establishes actionable consensus for the Commons but does not define Concordance.

Standing rule: “The Concordance” should not be used as shorthand for the Concordance Council. The Council is an expression of Concordance, not Concordance itself. Concordance as a framework, condition, and set of systems predates the Council and extends beyond it.

Related distinctions:

Convergence is a historical and civilizational process or event, not a legislature. The Convergence of the Bridge (Era V) is a period of rediscovery and reintegration, not a governing body.

the Commons is the mature civilizational order that emerges through that process. The Commons (Era VI) is the current-era civilization, not a process.

Joshua Gale predates the mature Commons and the Concordance Council. He first becomes functionally known as the Bridge during the Concordance Operations (Era II).

After Gale's operational period, the Bridge develops into office, doctrine, relay authority, continuity institution, and eventually a distributed continuity and witness function.

“Bridge of Concordance” — the exact phrase does not appear in either the Durable Master or this Bible. It is not canonical. The underlying concept — the Bridge's relationship to concordance — is extensively established: the office of the Bridge preserves concordance; the Bridge becomes concordance architecture during Convergence. 1. ****Joshua Gale (Historical Gale phase)**** — a human operator (courier, archivist, systems negotiator, determinant cargo handler, continuity officer) active during the Fracture Period. Not supernatural, not manifested.
2. ****Gale becomes "the Bridge"***** — through repeated success preserving passage, maintaining relay continuity, retaining records between hostile systems, and negotiating determinant transfer corridors. People say "Send it through the Bridge." The role overtakes the identity; he is still a man.
3. ****The First Concordance**** — after Gale's operational period, others formalize the methods. "The Bridge" becomes office, doctrine, relay authority, and continuity institution. Gale may be dead, missing, or unverified; the records diverge.

4. ****The Dispersion**** — the Bridge fragments into civilization; the Manifestation Tradition begins (cultural, not verified).

5. ****The Convergence / Distributed Manifestation Era**** — "the Bridge" is no longer one man, office, or institution; it becomes continuity principle, distributed witness function, relay intelligence, concordance architecture. Bridge-like operators emerge where continuity pressure becomes extreme.

Three Interpretive Schools (UNRESOLVED — no adjudication)

- "Gale was the first Bridge."
- "Gale was merely the clearest early carrier."
- "The Bridge produced Gale, not the reverse."

The corpus does not adjudicate among these. All three are preserved.

Preserved Origin Dispute (LOCKED — not pending)

Relay Custodianship

The ****Relay Custodian**** is the function that lives at a relay node and keeps it running.

"The relay does not move. It endures." Relay work is endurance labor: maintenance, monitoring, and the preservation of honest signal under fatigue and instability.

Translation & Relay Systems (Vol IV §8)

Translation systems govern conversion and verification of transmitted information.

Translation traffic is suspended during relay instability. The K-27 dispatches are preserved as canonical warnings: relay acknowledgments that are "structurally identical" and lack "human variance" are more alarming than silence — "the relay lies more convincingly."

They are trained to read environmental and human signals of instability before official systems detect them.

Wardens are described through recovered manual fragments and practice, not as a complete institutional specification. No full charter, ranks, or certification structure is established.

The K-27 Records (canonical exemplar)

The K-27 dispatches (hazard-adjacent relay station, Warden Sera Vale presumed author) are preserved and widely studied in relay academies. They document: relay acknowledgments losing human variance; structural-identical responses more alarming than silence; the recognition that "the relay now understands what we expect to see"; and the concluding warning: **"The relay lies more convincingly."** The records are studied not as proof of synthetic divergence contamination but as documentation of the psychological conditions produced by prolonged uncertainty near unstable continuity systems.

Hidden Storm (developmental, LOCKED Ruling 5)

Hidden Storm is preserved only at its current developmental certainty level as a monitoring function. Per Ruling 5: no headquarters, ranks, directors, command hierarchy, charter, statutory authority, warrant process, surveillance technology, standard operating procedures, fleet structure, uniforms, badges, or formal reporting lines were established. Persistence rather than perfect invisibility is stated as the probable defining quality; a competent Keeper may recognize continuity surveillance by method or pattern. Where the record is silent, the silence is preserved.

- Hidden Storm's institutional status is developmental/UNRESOLVED. Not established as a concrete institution.

A civilization is "wealthy" insofar as it can continue to hold.

"A Bridge cannot be understood without crossing it." The Journey embodies the civilizational conviction that continuity requires exposure to what lies outside one's own maintained systems, and that return enriches rather than corrupts.

The Journey and Drift (governed distinction)

- The Journey is ***voluntary*** outward experience and voluntary return.
- ***Drift*** is the descriptive, non-moral condition of unresolved relation (LOCKED, Ruling 1) — not a moral failing, not a pathology.
- A ***drifted Keeper*** is a Keeper in unresolved relation, judged by stewardship rather than affiliation.
- A ***drifter*** is a person in unresolved relation.
- ***Rogue Keeper*** status arises only from demonstrated conduct (LOCKED, Ruling 2), not from the Journey, drift, dissent, or departure.

Continuity Without Conformity

The Journey, drift, and the distinction among dissent / drift / drifted Keeper / Rogue Keeper together enact the summary principle: ***"continuity without requiring conformity."*** Trusted access may be restricted without compelling belief; temporary containment applies only to immediate continuity threats; reviewability, evidence, and appeal are structural.

Known Conflicts

I-10 — Reviewability Is Superior to Unreviewable Authority

Authority derives from evidence, provenance, witness, and reviewability. It is never self-authenticating.

I-11 — Human Witness Has Constitutional Standing

Systems, automation, archives, and institutions remain accountable to witnessed reality. Human observation, marginalia, field notes, and lived record are legitimate components of evidence.

I-12 — Continuity Is Active, Never Static

Continuity is maintained through ongoing stewardship. Static preservation alone is insufficient.

I-13 — Preservation Takes Precedence over Elegance

Editorial simplicity, symmetry, or narrative convenience never justify altering the record. The archive exists to preserve, not to simplify.

I-14 — Constitutional Silence Shall Be Preserved

Where Constitutional Canon is silent, future creators shall neither invent connective history nor imply constitutional certainty. Silence is an intentional component of the archive. Recommended options: - “predating the formalization of concordance systems” (broadest) - “predating the First Concordance” (specific era) - “predating the Concordance Compacts” (specific institution)

Classification: Requires author decision.

AD-2: “Bridge of Concordance” — future use of the exact phrase

Status for this edition: The exact phrase “Bridge of Concordance” does not appear in either document and is not canonical. The underlying concept — the Bridge’s relationship to concordance — is extensively established in canon. The Semantic Layers subsection in CB Part XXX explicitly states the phrase is non-canonical and provides

canonical alternatives (“the office of the Bridge,” “Bridge doctrine,” “concordance architecture”).

Future ruling required only if: The author later decides to introduce “Bridge of Concordance” as a formal title, institution name, or descriptive formulation. No current action is needed.

Classification: Resolved for this edition. Future author ruling required only if the phrase is later intentionally introduced.

AD-4: CE/BCE calendar system

Location: External framework (not in either document).

Issue: Neither the Durable Master nor the Creator’s Bible uses CE or BCE as a calendar system. The Creator’s Bible explicitly states: “No continuous calendar across all eras is established” (CB Part IV). Introducing CE/BCE would contradict this statement and require revising CB Part IV.

Why it cannot be resolved: The documents deliberately do not establish a continuous calendar. The author’s instruction confirms: “Do not impose a Commons period calendar unless the documents already contain an author-approved calendar decision.” No such decision exists in the source documents.

Classification: Requires author decision. If a calendar system is adopted, CB Part IV must be revised.

AD-6: Era numbering conflict (duplicate Roman numerals)

Location: Durable Master (era table); Creator’s Bible Part IV (era table).

Issue: The source corpus assigns duplicate Roman numerals to five era pairs. This duplication is acknowledged and preserved as UNRESOLVED in both documents. No renumbering has been performed.

Why it cannot be resolved: The era numbering comes from the author’s source corpus and represents a structural choice. Renumbering would affect cross-references throughout both documents and would alter the author’s established system. The duplication may be intentional (representing parallel or overlapping eras) or an artifact of the consolidation process. Only the author can determine which.

Classification: Unresolved by design. Author adjudication required if renumbering is desired.

AD-7: Concordance Council founding date

Location: Not specified in either document.

Issue: Neither the Durable Master nor the Creator’s Bible states when the Concordance Council was formally established. The “First Concordance” (Era III) describes the institutionalization of concordance systems but is not identified as the Council’s founding. Whether the Council predates, accompanies, or follows the formal beginning of the Commons period (Era VI) is unspecified.

Why it cannot be resolved: No source document provides a founding date, era, or event for the Concordance Council. The CB Part XXX Open Questions section (expanded in v1.2) now explicitly flags this as an open question, but the answer requires an author ruling.
